Dear residents and staff of Leisure World of Maryland,

In hopes of providing accurate communication and addressing your understandable concerns, we would like to provide you with information about an incident that occurred here yesterday.

At around 9:30 a.m., Montgomery County Police and Leisure World Security responded to a report from the Fairways South building. Responders determined that inside an apartment a small firearm had been discharged one time, resulting in a non-life threatening leg injury to a young female visitor. A young male visiting with her, whom police believed had discharged the firearm, had left the scene. The injured woman was transported to the hospital. The male visitor was apprehended less than an hour later outside Leisure World on Bel Pre Road.

The safety and security of all Leisure World residents being of paramount concern to us, we issued as soon as possible a Robo-call alerting residents to the emergency situation based on the information we had at the time. We issued a follow-up Robocall as soon as possible after police assured us that any potential threat to residents' safety had passed.

We are grateful for the quick and efficient response of police, security, and even Montgomery County Fire and Rescue personnel who happened to be at Fairways South when the event occurred.

We appreciate your patience and concern about the matter, and we thank you for understanding that we always strive to keep residents safe within our community.

Re: Update on Feb. 2 shooting incident

We would like to update you with information about an incident in Fairways South, Building 5, that occurred last week. We appreciate your and the community's concerns, and we seek to provide you with reliable facts as we work to assemble them with Montgomery County Police (MCP) in their continuing investigation.

On Friday, Feb. 3, we sent a letter to the LWCC board of directors and all Leisure World employees, including Mutual assistants and property managers, providing some details about the incident. We can now add:

• A Fairways South resident granted her granddaughter access to the building the evening of Wednesday, Feb. 1, and allowed her to stay overnight on her sofa. The granddaughter arrived alone.

• The morning of Thursday, Feb. 2, the resident, responding to a loud noise, discovered the granddaughter's boyfriend in the residence, leaving. The resident believes her granddaughter granted him access to the building.

• The resident also discovered that her granddaughter had been shot in the leg. The injury was minor, and the granddaughter was transported to the hospital for treatment. She was later released.

• MCP apprehended the granddaughter's boyfriend, arrested him on Bel Pre Road and took him into custody. He was charged with first-degree assault and an additional charge, which MCP have not yet shared. He has been unable to make bond and remains in custody.

• We anticipate the MCP Community Outreach Officer will report back to LW Security on Thursday or Friday this week with additional information, which we will be eager to share with you and the community.

Thank you for your understanding as we continue to provide information when we receive it. We are committed to communicating all details that keep our residents safe and well informed.

Our Free Tree from the "Tree Montgomery" Program Is Finally Here!

Several months ago, Mutual 16 was notified that we would receive a free tree from a Montgomery County program that offered to plant shade trees throughout the County to save energy as well as add beauty to parks and other areas. Our Mutual did not have a say in what kind of tree that we might receive under the program. We have a "fruitless" Kentucky Coffee tree. Our tree is a hybrid that does not bear fruit. However, as the name suggests, the fruit from this species can be roasted and used as a coffee substitute. At maturity, the tree will reach 50-70 feet in height with a crown that is 40-50 feet wide. The tree may live to be over 100 years old. The tree is planted in the park area by the "rock". It will provide great shade for the benches in future years!

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A "Fire-Safe Cooking" checklist from the U.S. Fire Administration Emergency Preparedness Advisory Committee

According to the U.S. Fire Administration, adults age 65 and older are more than twice as likely to die in fires as the Nation's population as a whole. Older adults also

have a higher risk of injury from fires. This checklist offers suggestions for "fire safe cooking".

- Don't cook if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, or have taken medication or drugs that make you drowsy.
- ✓ Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly. Remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- ✓ Turn pot handles away from the stove's edge.
- ✓ Keep cooking surfaces clean and free from anything that can catch fire.
- ✓ Never lean over a lit burner.
- ✓ Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves while cooking. Loose clothing can catch fire if it touches a gas flame or an electric burner.
- Check the kitchen after you finish cooking. Make sure the oven, burners, and other appliances are off.

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REPORT FROM THE HEALTH ADVISORY COMMITTEE By Jean Jones

The Health Advisory Committee has a number of enthusiastic new members this year, so plans for seminars and lectures are underway. In addition, there are two areas in which the Committee has been very active since January—1) negotiations for continuation of MedStar services at the Leisure World Medical Center (LWMC) as

well as monitoring of current services; 2) involvement in recent health concerns regarding the Leisure World restaurants.

LWMC—negotiations with MedStar to lease and operate LWMC should be concluded by the end of March. It is expected that MedStar will lease slightly less space than it does now. The lease and operating agreement will probably be for another 5 years with an additional 5-year option.

In addition, a dermatologist, a podiatrist and an orthopedic surgeon have been added to the staff. The podiatrist and the dermatologist have started. I have had two favorable reports concerning care given by the dermatologist. The orthopedist has not started yet because a room for x-ray equipment has to be modified and leadlined. This should be done by the end of March. At first, x-ray services will be limited to orthopedic problems only, but that may be expanded later.

RESTAURANTS—as most of you know, the restaurants were briefly closed in December by the County Health Department for health violations. The restaurants are usually inspected about 4 times a year routinely, or in response to complaints. In the past, these inspection reports were not provided to the Health Committee or to the Restaurant Committee. That policy has now changed. In response to concerns expressed by the residents and the committees,

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The Board of Directors passed a resolution requiring all County Health inspection reports to be provided to the Health Committee and the Restaurant Committee within 5 days. Leisure World, the operator of the restaurants, and the County now inspect the restaurants each week to ensure compliance, but no formal report is issued with regard to these voluntary inspections.

Also, the main kitchen will be closed for several weeks in February for installation of a new dishwasher, and repairs to a large wall and the structures behind it associated with the dishwasher. From the looks of it (dumpster and storage pod outside), the work has started. The Grille will have a limited menu during the work, but the other restaurants should be open. See the LW News for exact dates and details.

PROGRAMS—the Mental Health Subcommittee is sponsoring a panel discussion for caregivers of people with dementia on March 8 from 8am-2:30pm. On April 24, there will be a program on the 10 signs of dementia. If you remember to go, you probably don't need to. Also, the fan-favorite all-day Health Fair will happen on May 18, from 10-2 in Clubhouse 1.

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
