FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

It's budget time again! I'm sure I do not have to tell you that everything has gone up in the past year. **Edwin Bradley**, our Treasurer, has been diligently working with Accounting to calculate the condo fees for next year. He has informed me that, regrettably, our monthly fees for next year are going to be increasing again. It's true that our insurance bill will be lower than last year (because of the great work of **Betsy Davis** and **Paula Seebode** to find a better policy), BUT those savings will be offset by price hikes in both electricity and water. And we will also see the routine increase in the Comcast contract, as well as the normal escalation in community fees due to the general inflation of overall expenses.

I have asked in the past and I will ask you again to make a concerted effort to conserve electricity and water. Both have a direct relationship to our condo fees. I will try to present some tips in the coming months to help you conserve. In the meantime, please try to do whatever you can. In this hot summer weather, I think the most helpful suggestion would be to raise the temperature of your air conditioner. Just one degree would help.

If you attended the Mutual's Board of Directors meeting on August 9, you know that a motion was passed to transfer management of the Mutual's Reserve Fund to Morgan Stanley Wealth Management Group. This will enable the Mutual to receive better rates on investments. Several other Mutuals have transferred to this Morgan Stanley fund with improved returns on their money. In this time of financial uncertainty, the Board of Directors felt a move like this was needed. Morgan Stanley charges no fees and has access to over 600 companies offering investment opportunities.

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SMART COOKIES AUGUST RECIPE

FROM PATTI STRADE: PUDDING CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES



INGREDIENTS 2¼ cups flour 1 package vanilla instant pudding 1 teaspoon baking soda

- \Box 2 eqqs
- \Box 1 cup softened butter
- \Box 12 ounces milk chocolate chips
- 🗆 ¼ cup sugar
- □ 1 teaspoon vanilla
- □ ¾ cup light brown sugar

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 375°F
- Mix flour with the baking soda in separate bowl
- Combine butter, sugars, vanilla and pudding mix and beat well until smooth and creamy
- Add eggs to butter mixture and beat well
- Gradually add flour mixture
- Stir in chocolate chips
- Drop by teaspoons (I use a scoop) onto a baking sheet (I use a stone which works the best)
- Bake for 8–10 minutes until light brown on top
- Cool for a few minutes on baking stone, then move to rack to cool

NOTE: You can also use chocolate pudding mix or mint chips.



She volunteered for the Bobby Kennedy campaign in 1968 and did a summer internship with Maryland congressman Gilbert Gude. From that time, she knew she wanted to work on Capitol Hill.

Upon graduating from Towson State College, she embarked on the three-month tour of Europe: the highlights of which included the Anne Frank house, Dachau Concentration Camp, and Checkpoint Charley in Berlin. Can you sense a theme?

She was offered the first job she interviewed for: an entry-level position on the staff of Congressman Robert Mollohan of West Virginia. Because she was in the right place at the right time, she has shaken hands with Mother Teresa, Anwar Sadat, Pamela Harriman, and four US Presidents, Democrat and Republican. But most important to her was that, along the way, she, with her team, helped veterans get benefits, helped small business people get loans, helped families negotiate the immigration system, helped young people get military academy appointments... the list goes on and on.

Colleen retired in 2011. As she tells it: It was the end of a job she loved. At the same time, it was the beginning of a retirement she loves. She cared for her best friend during his last illness. At the same time, she helped care for her newborn great-nieces and nephew (triplets) – endings bittersweet, beginnings joyous.

She moved to Mutual 16 in 2018. Selling her house in Virginia and buying her house here left her with a nest egg to use for traveling. She has been to Dubai, Jordan, Egypt, Oman, Abu Dhabi, Israel, Greece, the south of France, Tuscany and more. Her passions for history, research and politics continue in retirement. ROBO-CALLS:

The Mutual 16 President directs the robo-call system to alert residents about immediate situations in the mutual. TRASH SCHEDULE

Here's the schedule for garbage and recycling pickups, with specific requirements for each. Note: garbage and recycling night before their pickup days.

- GARBAGE: Pickup days are Tuesday and Friday. Be sure your garbage can is tightly covered.
- GLASS/METAL/PLASTIC RECYCLING: Pickup days are Tuesday and Friday. Recycling should be in If you need a blue container, you can get one from PPD.
- PAPER/CARDBOARD RECYCLING: Pickup day is on Wednesday only. Paper/cardbood should be placed in a blue recycling container. Large boxes may be set out separately. Secure properly so paper doesn't fly around when it's windy.
- YARD DEBRIS: BY REQUEST ONLY on Monday and Thursday. Contact the Grounds Department 301-598debris for pickup. Use tall brown paper recycling bags. Phone calls are preferred, but you may also email grounds@lwmc.com.
