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# **SMART COOKIES JANUARY RECIPE**

# PAULA SEEBODE'S MOLASSES SUGAR COOKIES

Cookies aren't just for the holidays. On a wintery day, fill your home with the warmth and scent of these fresh-baked treats.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- ☐ ¾ cup shortening
- ☐ 1 cup white sugar
- ☐ ¼ cup molasses
- □ 1 egg, beaten
- ☐ 2¼ cups all-purpose flour
- ☐ ½ teaspoon salt
- ☐ 2 teaspoons baking soda
- ☐ ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- ☐ 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- $\square$  1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ☐ Sugar for rolling

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- Cream shortening and sugar. Add molasses and egg. Mix well. Combine flour, soda, salt and spices; add to sugar mixture, mix until blended. Shape dough into 1 inch balls; roll in sugar.
- Place 2 inches apart on greased cookie sheets; flatten slightly.
  Bake at 375 degrees F for 8-10 minutes. These freeze well.

# **MEETING NOTES**

SUMMARY OF MUTUAL 16 BOD (BOARD OF DIRECTORS) MEETING January 11, 2022 Zoom Meeting.

- Melissa Pelaez gave the General Manager's report: Leisure World finances are in good shape. We end the year with a surplus. Several months of 2021 had better than average home sale numbers. Gate project has had some personnel setbacks slowing implementation of automated gate access; however the Beta testing group should be contacted by week's end. The construction at Clubhouse I is a bit behind schedule due to weather issues.
- Treasurer's report: The BOD resolved to pay the Directors fidelity insurance policy premium of \$2758; The BOD resolved to reinvest a maturing CD at the best term available.
- There were no LW advisory committee reports.
- Insurance: The BOD will continue to gather information. Management sent us a copy of the current Directors and Officers Policy for comparison to those of other companies.
- Maintenance: There are several shingle and gutter repairs in the pipeline and the concrete work at 408 Parker Creek and 15504 Prince Frederick Way is tentatively expected to begin in early February.
- Park: The Park committee is asking for winter monetary donations to be ready to beautify the Park in Spring
- Open Forum: Discussion of what expenses went into the large rise in the condo fee. The bulk of the rise is due to the rise in the cost of insurance premiums, a small amount is due to a rise in the community facilities fee and an even smaller amount is due to Mutual 16 expenses like an increased contribution to the roof reserve.


In 2000, when they were considering retiring, they conducted a controlled research study to find the best place to retire. They chose Bellingham,

After a wonderful weekend with all of our family celebrating the wedding of our first grandson in Virginia Beach, the day of our return began somewhat ominously! Overnight, there was a heavy rain and wind storm which kept us awake off and on through the night.

In the morning, in preparation for our departure, I took our luggage out to the car and found it parked in a pond that was supposed to be the parking lot for the 16 houses in the complex! The water was about 6 to 8 inches deep, which was easily higher than the tops of my shoes! A change of socks and a move of the car allowed us to load the car and pick up our other grandson who had volunteered to be our driver for the weekend.

The drive from Virginia Beach through Norfolk, Hampton, and Williamsburg proceeded uneventfully until we ran into the snow and ice halfway to Richmond. It had been snowing for quite some time by then, and our WAZE navigation had us try alternate routes, but before long, we were forced to abandon them and try to get back to I-95. Traffic was heavy and slow, but moving. When our fuel began to get low, we attempted to find gas toward Rt. 1. This was difficult because there were power outages throughout the entire area and almost all the gas stations and other businesses were closed. We followed Rt. 1 and eventually found one station that was open because they had their own generator, but it was selling gas CASH ONLY! Fortunately, we are in the habit of having some cash with us when we travel, so we were able to fill the tank.

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We got our gas and proceeded down Rt. 1, which was completely snow-covered and frozen over, until we heard that it was closed near Quantico. Our only option appeared to be getting back to I-95, which we were able to do in about an hour, approximately ten miles south of Quantico. We traveled about two miles before traffic came to a complete standstill at 9:20 PM Monday evening.

And... there we sat until sometime after 6:30 AM Tuesday. During that time, we dined on water and light snacks which happened to have been given to us as a gift bag from the Bride and Groom as we left the Wedding Reception. THANK GOD!

We watched them clear the Express Lanes, hoping they were going to open for traffic! HAH! Not only did that not happen, there was no sighting of emergency vehicles or Police cars... or the bread truck that was reported in the news! Finally, around 6:30 AM, traffic inched forward for about five or ten miles and then started to move a little better. About four and a half hours later, we arrived home, and fell into bed for a couple of hours.

All told, it was over 25 hours in the car with no facilities and what little food and water we happened to have with us!

The one thing that kept us on track was our grandson Bobby who was not only as calm and collected as anyone could be in such circumstances, but also provide us with great music and connections to various newscasts and other programs through his modern technology, that gave us some insight to what was going on around us! ### The New York Times Stranded Drivers Are Freed After 24-Hour Snowy Ordeal on I-95 in Virginia

Hundreds were stuck overnight on the interstate south of Washington. A United States senator was among those trapped.

JAN. 4, 2022

Emergency crews on Tuesday afternoon freed the last of hundreds of drivers stranded by a snowstorm on Interstate 95 in Virginia, after more than 24 shivering hours of watching gas gauges drop, rationing food and water and holding out for any kind of help.

A 40-mile stretch of the highway — one of the busiest travel corridors in the United States — came to a standstill overnight after a fast-falling snowstorm led to jackknifed tractor-trailers and hundreds of other accidents. Some people abandoned their cars. Many, including a U.S. senator, spent the night on the snowy highway.

For example, it turns out that the original residents (40 plus years ago) referred to our mutual as "The Potomac of Leisure World" and "Mutual Sweet Sixteen" – so there's the back story for that option.

And so far, all of the other named mutuals selected a name based on street names in their community. Mutual 16 is fortunate since it looks like we have more options than those other mutuals.

#### "FILE OF LIFE"

Do you have a red vinyl "File of Life" magnetically attached to your refrigerator door? If not, they are free at the Leisure World Medical Center. Keep it updated with info concerning medications, doctors, and contacts to be notified in case of serious illness. This information is very important to an emergency crew when they are called in due to a sudden illness. The rescue crew will check your refrigerator door for the "File of Life."

#### **ROBO-CALLS:**

The Mutual 16 President directs the robo-call system to alert residents about immediate situations in the mutual. It may be a notice about a repair that affects residents' water service, a last-minute change to a meeting time, or even a "silver alert" for a missing vulnerable neighbor. **Ellen Darr** manages the robo-call directory. To remove your listing, or switch it from land-line to mobile, contact ellenmdarr@gmail.com

#### **TRASH SCHEDULE**

Here's the schedule for garbage and recycling pickups, with specific requirements for each. Note: garbage and recycling night before their pickup days.

- GARBAGE: Pickup days are Tuesday and Friday. Be sure your garbage can is tightly covered.
- GLASS/METAL/PLASTIC RECYCLING: Pickup days are Tuesday and Friday. Recycling should be in the appropriate blue container. If you need a blue container, you can get one from PPD.
- PAPER/CARDBOARD RECYCLING: Pickup day is on Wednesday only. Paper/cardbood should be placed in a blue recycling container. Large boxes may be set out separately. Secure properly so paper doesn't fly around when it's windy.
- YARD DEBRIS: BY REQUEST ONLY on Monday and Thursday. Contact the Grounds Department email grounds@lwmc.com or call 301-598-1314 to notify them you have yard debris for pickup. Use tall brown paper recycling bags. **NO REQUESTS** BETWEEN DECEMBER AND MARCH.
