# **GOLF REPORT 2020**

Don't put your golf clubs away! Even with December's chilly days, there is no need to stop playing golf. The course is open year round, weather permitting.

Golf is the only activity besides walking alone - that is naturally social distanced. It has enjoyed a banner year. The golf course is the only activity generating revenue above what was budgeted for the year in Leisure World. This year we will be more than 4.000 rounds above normal - a 30% increase and that number was held down due to restrictions on the number of people who can play and ride in golf carts. This increase in rounds generated revenue \$80K above and beyond budget projections. There were many days when we were completely sold out. All of this in spite of being closed for 47 days in spring.

Some on-going issues are proposed renovations and the concern about walkers. No golf course in the country allows walkers during operation because it is dangerous for both the walkers and golfers. The golf course is over 50 years old and has drainage issues. The proposals for renovating the golf course and fixing the problems are waiting for funding.

# **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PLAN**

Mutual 16 consists of 95 one level, two- and three-bedroom units, and approximately 120 residents who are expected to take some responsibility and initiative to be prepared in case of emergencies.

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#### **BASIC PREPARATIONS**

Check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors at least once a year Prepare a disaster supply kit that contains food, water, and supplies for at least three days. Consider having supplies for sheltering in place for at least two weeks as well as a battery-operated radio, corded telephone, and one or more working flashlights.

Keep informed: Radio alert systems can be found on AM 630, AM 1500, FM 107.7, FM 103.5, and FM 88.5.

#### GO-BAG

You should assemble a Go-Bag in case of an emergency evacuation. A duffle bag or a roller suitcase works well. **YOU MUST BE ABLE TO CARRY OR ROLL IT.** Suggested items include:

- Several changes of weatherappropriate clothes and sturdy shoes
- Cash in small bills
- Hygiene items (toothbrush, toothpaste, brush/comb, deodorant, soap, wash cloth, make-up, etc.)
- Eyeglasses/contacts and solution (if applicable)
- Comfort items (books, photo album, puzzle book, wine)
- Cell phone charger
- Contact info of friends/family
- At least a 3-day supply of needed medications

- Copies of important documents in waterproof bag (Medicare/Medicaid insurance cards, photo ID, proof of address, marriage and birth certificates, copies of credit/debit cards)
- Face masks, hand sanitizer, and sanitizing wipes

#### In case of FIRE:

- Leave your home immediately at first sign of any fire. Take your cell phone or cordless phone with you. DO NOT TRY TO FIGHT THE FIRE
- IMMEDIATELY call 911
- Alert neighbors attached to your unit
- Follow instructions of the first responders

#### In case of HURRICANE:

- Stay in your home and away from windows until storm is over
- Listen to local TV and radio for instruction regarding local conditions before leaving your home

#### In case of TORNADO:

- Stay in your home when a tornado WATCH is announced
- Immediately go to an interior room or hallway and stay away from all windows when a tornado WARNING is announced

**Betsy Davis** of 15548 Prince Frederick Way, has lived a globe-trotting life. organizations and the US government. All her jobs involved a great deal of traveling, taking her to 36 countries on five continents. She "retired" in 2010 but immediately went back to work part-time for the Peace Corps, working from home before it was a thing. She moved to Leisure World in 2016.

Betsy loves languages, seeing the world, and old friends. She still speaks fluent Portuguese and Spanish; travels whenever she can; and gets together with friends she has had for over fifty years. Betsy's guiding philosophy is to promote respect and peace among all people... and dogs. Since 1984, she has adopted 6 golden retrievers, one Labrador retriever, and one beagle. She always adopts older dogs because she says "they don't deserve to be dumped after they've given their whole lives to some humans – and older dogs are always so grateful." # **SECURITY AND TRANSPORTATION**

The automated gate access system, approved by the Leisure World Board of Directors, was expected to be operational by late this year — but there have been a few snags. The company we were dealing with has withdrawn, so now we have a new company that submitted their proposal in September.

The company is Gate Logic Security in Manassas, Virginia. They are proposing an oval decal placed in the inside of the windshield. The decal will have an individual number to identify the car owner (much the same as what we have now) but it will also have a chip to activate the Gate Access system.

The good news: The question concerning the hours of operation for the Norbeck Gate is still up in the air. They want to wait until the system is operational to decide the hours. Some residents have asked if it might be considered to have the gate operational 24/7 since there will be no gate guard.

Another item you might find interesting. Someone suggested that the position of gate guard be filled by Leisure World residents. It's true that LW has trouble filling that position. It tends to attract young people who need a job right away but not necessarily looking for a career. It pays minimum wage. It's not necessarily a crazy idea, and is worth thinking about.

Here's another little tidbit for you to think about. It was another Mutual which made the initial inquiry which resulted in a presentation from an officer of the Montgomery County Police Department. It's called "Neighborhood Watch" and is mighty effective in fighting crime. It's basically neighbors watching for and reporting suspicious activities. "If You See Something, Say Something."

Our Mutual pretty much looks out for itself — at least that is my observation for the past two years. We may not know everybody in the Mutual, but we know our immediate neighbors. Don't hesitate to call the Main Gate (301-598-1044) if you think there is something suspicious going on. Report what you see and let the Special Police Officers decide.

## WINTERIZE YOUR HOME

So far, It has been a relatively warm fall and winter.

Before we get into the heart of winter please check that you have winterized your home.

- Disconnect all outside hoses from the faucet. This reduces the likelihood your outdoor faucet will freeze.
- Drain your hose and put it away. This keeps your hose from freezing and splitting.
- Close all the air conditioner vents in the ceiling. You may need a ladder or you may be able to close them using a broom handle. This will reduce drafts.
- Remove the air conditioner return filter. Clean it. Wrap it with aluminum foil and put it back. This will reduce drafts. Be sure to reverse this process before you run the air conditioner in the spring.

These actions will take under 30 minutes and will keep your house safe from flooding and will keep it warmer.
