Keep in mind that a large portion of your monthly fees are directly attributable to the amount of electricity used. Both the air conditioners and the heaters use huge amounts of electricity. Also, please turn **OFF** your outside lights during daylight hours. Every little bit counts.

LANDSCAPING

Crabgrass and Weeds

As most of you know, the Montgomery County Council passed legislation last year forcing everyone except golf courses and school athletic fields to "go green." That means we can no longer use most chemical-based weed killers on the lawns.

We could use PREEM™ as a pre-emergent for crabgrass. We could use FIESTA® (an iron-based product) as postemergent weed control. The cost of the recommended applications would be an extra \$15,471.00 for next year – in addition to what we already pay for grass maintenance. This comes out to an extra \$162.85 per unit yearly or \$13.57 extra per unit per month.

In addition to the high cost, the alternatives just don't work very well. If you think you have a lot of weeds already, get prepared for a lot more. Because of this, your Board of Directors voted against the change.

One silver lining to the pandemic has been the resurgence of playing Golf all across the country, and Leisure World is no exception. As a sport, social distancing is built into the play – especially for amateurs. With only one person to a golf cart, players tend to not be close to one another.

Leisure World golf was closed for 47 days this spring. However, we are now over 1,000 rounds ahead of last year, which was a good year. Membership is up 20% and revenues are \$38K more than budgeted.

Remember, anyone may walk the golf cart paths (not the grass or greens) in the morning before 8 AM on the front 9 holes, and up until 9:30 AM on the back nine holes. (The front nine is the Clubhouse II side of the course, and the back nine is the GlenEagles side.) Anyone may walk both nines after 6:30 PM; however, you will have to share the course with golfers. Some basic commonsense rules are as follows: always face the golfers playing toward you, stop moving while the golfer is hitting the ball, and for your safety try to watch where the ball is going after being hit.



HINTS, TIPS, AND MORE

TRASH TALK

When storms roll through our community, they can produce strong and gusty winds. This often leads to our trash being blown away, littering the neighborhood. Consider what you can do to minimize this problem. Pay attention to predicted gusty winds or storms for the days when our pickups are scheduled. Delay putting out your trash, recycling, and paper until the morning of the pickup. Make sure you have lids that can be firmly attached to these containers. For the paper recycle containers, put heavier items (such as magazines) on the top. For recycling, minimize over-filling by using a larger container, or multiple containers.

And don't forget: Cardboard can be included with our paper and magazine recycling on Wednesdays. This would include any cardboard, e.g., shipping boxes, cereal boxes, shoe boxes, etc.

Many of us have critical documents such as birth certificates, automobile titles, real estate documents, etc. in bank safe deposit boxes. 
